On the 23rd the County Camping Competition took place and was led by Olly Brown with Stuart Livesey,Leo Gould,David Leader and Guy Knagg. We had warned Olly that this would be a tough one. The result proved this as we came in joint last. I was not as disappointed with this result as Olly was.

On the 23rd we also had the Great River Race, which was over a distance of 19.5 miles, from Richmond to Greenwich. The day started at 08.00hrs at Ham car park, where we all met for the start of the Race. The crew consisted of Simon Leo, Paul Livesey, Richard Merry, Jonathan Merry and a Sea Ranger named Jane, with me as coxwain and an extra rowing hand when required. Our aim was to cover the distance in under 4 hours. We actually completed the row in 3 hours,44 minutes,52 seconds. We don't know our placing yet as we did not wait for the results, knowing it would take us longer to get home, than it took to do the race. Other participants from Leander were 2 Venture Scouts, Andrew Bennett and Nick White. The Sea Rangers made up the rest of the crews with our GSL as cox. We also had crews from Fulwell Garage, who I must say rowed very well, so well in fact that they beat us by 15 minutes, and were coxed by Chips. The rescur boat was handled by Rod and Ness from the Sea Rangers. As you can see the Sea Rangers took a great part in this race, and for that I would like to say 'Thank you'.

On Sunday, the 24th September, we had our first 'Going Up Ceremony' with all the parents attending. This day proved to be a success as the Beavers went up to Cubs, and the Cubs up to Scouts, and all parties were invested on the spot. The parents then took to the river in our boats. It always looks easy from the bank, but when you actually get in one and row it, then it becomes a little bit harder! A Bar B Que was held upstairs at the same time, and everyone had a good feast. My only complaint was, where was every one when the boats had to be put away? Next time the parents can do this bit as well.

A fire fighting course has been laid on at Kingston Fire Station for 6 weeks in October. In November, an Airmans basic training course has been arranged to take place in New Malden. We also have at least three other District events to take part in during October and November.

SEA SCOUTING SKILLS

"BOATING ORDERS"

Boating orders vary slightly between different Sea Scout Groups, however it is very important that everyone within the same Group uses the same orders. The following are the boating orders used in Leander.

1) Crew Assembly

The crew line up on the bank facing away from the River. The coxswain then numbers off the crew and they 'fall in', in order, stroke nearest the bows, three, two and then bow, if the crew has a separate bow man, he falls in aft of bow.

2) Crew Positions



3) Boarding

The coxswain will give the order - ABOARD CREW, BOW STAND FAST, (where there is a Bowman, the order will be for Bowman to stand fast instead of Bow) The coxswain will board first, followed by Stroke, Three and Two, in that order. Bow (Bowman) will remain ashore. The crew should board one at a time, stepping <u>over</u> thwarts until they reach their rowing positions.

4) Getting under Weigh

The coxswain ships the rudder and yoke before giving the order, "HANG ON TWO WITH THE BOATHOOK" followed by "CAST OFF BOW". Bow will then cast off the sternfast and pass it to the coxswain,cast off the painter and stow it, and then come aboard. "TAKE OVER THE BOATHOOK BOW". Bow remains standing and takes

boathook from two. Two then sits in position(where there is a Bowman, the bowman casts off whilst the boat hook is initially held by bow)

"SHOVE OFF BOW" (Bowman). Bow will then put the boathook behind him and push on it to bear the bow of the boat upstream and out into the stream. When the boat is sufficiently clear of the bank, the coxswain will give the order "OARS", the crew will then take fendoffs inboard, ship crutches and position oars parallel with the water and at right angles to the boat. Stroke lifts the blade of twos oar and places it forward of his crutch before getting his own oar out. Bow remains standing, stows the boathook(hook facing to bow) and then ships his oar before sitting down. N.B. Oar blades are stowed in the boat with blades towards stern except bow oar which is stowed with blade facing the bow. SEA SCOUTING SKILLS

Continued.... (4) "STAND BY" - Crew leans forward ready to row. "GIVE WEIGH TOGETHER" - Stroke will give crew six short strokes, and then lengthen the stroke. (5) Manoeuvring under Weigh Except for the order "HOLD WATER ALL" which is executed immediately, the crew should execute orders one stroke after the order is given. TRAIL OARS - swing oars parallel to the boat. SHORTEN OARS - continue rowing with oars drawn in towards the oarsman. OARS ACROSS THE BOAT - Stop rowing, draw oars to lay across the gunwales. PULL UP PORT - (STARBOARD) EASY STARBOARD(PORT) - to turn the boat in the required direction. PULL UP PORT(STARBOARD) BACK HER DOWN STARBOARD(PORT)- to turn boat in limited space. HOLD WATER ALL -push stroke to check weigh BACK WATER ALL -To go astern. GIVE WEIGH TOGETHER - order to resume rowing ordinarily after a manoeuvre - number of short strokes are indicated with the order "TWO (THREE etc) SHORT" (6) Coming Alongside IN BOW. Bow will cease rowing, put his oar across the boat, stand up, unship his oar and stow it blade forward, unship his crutch, take up his boathook, and be ready to grip or check weigh. THIS ORDER MUST BE GIVEN IN AMPLE TIME. WEIGH ENOUGH. Oars swung in and stowed, crutches unshipped, and fendoffs put out. When alongside TAKE OVER THE BOATHOOK TWO, ASHORE BOW WITH THE PAINTER. When made fast, coxswain will pass the sternfast, and bow will make it fast, SHIP THE BOATHOOK TWO. Two will place the boathook hook forward next to bows oar. NO ONE ELSE GOES ASHORE UNTIL THE COXSWAIN GIVES THE ORDER. 'ASHORE CREW'. They will then leave the boat by the bows, and fall in on the bank as before for dismissal. BOATS CREW ALERT. TURNING RIGHT. DISMISS.
