The programme continues in much the same vein as before and activities have included the normal camps, night hikes, etc. The Under 14 Crew did particularly well in the Great River Race, coming 2nd in their class beating Steadfast, our older boys crew and the composite Sea Ranger/Leader crew. Congratulations are also due for the troop winning the District Swimming Gala - something we have not done for a number of years now.

As you know, our safety boat was stolen last summer and it took a considerable time to get the insurance company to pay out. As an interim measure we took the decision to buy a new outboard motor to put on oen of our xisting dinghies whilst looking for a suitable larger vessel which we could leave on the moorings.

We have therefore just purchased a second-hand 17' Microplus day boat, powered by a 25hp outboard. The boat has a small forward cabin and large open cockpit area and should proove invaluable for accompanying the troop on river expeditions next year, as well as giving the older members the opportunity to handle a larger boat under power. The boat's size is also such that we can trail it to the coast for summer camps.

The older members of the troop have now "broken away" and are in the process of reforming the Venture Unit. They are meeting on Monday nights after Beavers and I await them formally electing a Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary. With six Venture Scouts they now havbe an opportunity for an adventurous programmge and I look forward to future reports on their activities.

On the HQ/Building front, thanks to Mr Osborn, the planks along the river frontage have now been renewed and screeding the balcony (bridge) with a waterproof "plastic" concrete is planned.

Mick Chinnock has also volunteered to lead a concreting party to continue the surfacing at the side of the building - so volunteers from parents to help Mick please!

Finally, our thanks to Marion Duffin for again agreeing to organise the Supporters NewYear/Christmas Dinner (details at end). If you want to go, I would recommend early booking as sumbers are limited to about 50!.

#### COXSWAIN'S CORNER

This year we decided to have a proper land camp and do some of the activities that, as Sea Scouts, we often don't get time to practice. Hulsh Woods camp site in Someset was our destination, so as the school holidays started, our party of 14 set off - with very grateful assistance from the YMCA, who provided a minibus when the one we had arranged to se, from Surbit9n Sea Lions, broke it's gearbox the day before.

The site, a few miles outside Taunton, is heavily wooded, with a great range of facilities. We had a really nice pitch surrounded by tall trees - as the weather was scorching hot they provided essential shade.

Despite the heat, we completed all our planned programme. We had a Harc and Hounds competition, built a very large bridge using all the pioneering timbers there, and went on a night hike - that became quite peic as some of the footpaths had been ploughed over.

Backwoodsman, Camp Cook and Pioneering badges were gained, and by popular request there was a wide game almost every night. A day was spent at Sidmouth on the beach and even though we took a dining shelter for some shade, it was so hot we went to Exeter and cooled off in the leisure pool there. We also went to the Bridgewater Splash pool a couple of times, which proved very popular.

On the last day the weather was much cooler, so we did a hike across the Quantock Hills - terrific views of Wales and the Bristol Channel to the North and Dartmoor to the South.
