For the Scouts’ first meeting after the Christmas break, we decided to help them burn off some of their Christmas excesses by setting up an obstacle course for them. They competed in teams and as individuals on a course of varying complexity and difficulty, ranging from easy to blindfolded.

In preparation for the upcoming County night exercise, the next two meetings were dedicated to map reading exercises and then completing a compass course around Canbury Gardens and along the river. To put all the theory into practice, the next meeting was a mini-night-hike in the area around Ham House, the majority of which was on paths and fields with only one road to be crossed. We also managed to cross paths with some of Peter-sham and Ham’s Sea Scouts, who were geocaching in the same area.

We wanted to teach the Scouts some of the traditions and history of Scouting, so Coxswain (Robin) ran an evening entitled ‘Scouting: the old days’, where the Scouts learnt about Scouting’s history and why certain aspects of Scouting exist as they do.

On the 9th of February a small contingent of the Scouts competed in the County cooking competition with the theme of ‘Olympic cookery’. The Scouts did very well and gained 2nd place in Kingston and Malden

District and 9th overall in the competition. My thanks go to Chris Stone, who helped and supervised the Scouts for the competition, as well as acting as taxi driver for them. Much appreciated, Chris!



The meeting before half term was run by the Cub Leaders, Tim and Chris, where they re-created their ‘Escape room’ activity for the Scouts. All the Scouts managed to decode the clues and ‘escape’, with thankfully no bits of them blown off by the bomb being detonated. Thanks Tim and Chris.

Each year we try to incorporate at least one Activity Badge into the programme and this term the Scouts completed the Local Knowledge badge. To complete this they had to research and name local tourist attractions and places of interest, sporting and leisure facilities, emergency services and local amenities. They also had to plan several journeys using public transport, as well as research the tide tables and plan a trip down the river to Richmond and back.

Our final meeting of the term, although we didn’t know it at the time, was a swimming session at New Malden leisure centre, where nearly all the Scouts who attended gained a higher level on their Swimming Activity badge.

Now to the present: As you now all Scouting activities in the UK have been suspended due to the Covid-19 virus. Several activities and a camp that we were going to run have been cancelled, with possibly more to come. The Regatta looks doubtful, but my fingers are crossed that the Summer Camp will still be able to take place at the end of July.
