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Scouts reach for the stars!

On our resumption of Scout meetings after the Summer break we were able to get out on the water for one last evening, before the nights drew in and it became impractical.

Wide games at Canbury Gardens were undertaken the following week, with the Scouts haring around all over the place, startling members of the public.

The following week we ran a signalling exercise for the Scouts where they send signals to other patrols via nautical flags, semaphore, Morse code and then by using the phonetic alphabet to transmit messages using our UHF radios. Most of the messages got through and the inevitable rude messages and innuendo were hastily curtailed by the leaders (where detected)!

To help the Scouts avoid being stuck in Bushy Park the following week we ran a basic compass navigation and map reading exercise at the HQ, to get them up to speed on six figure grid references and interpreting map symbols and pathways.

The mini-hike in Bushy Park went relatively seamlessly but was made slightly more interesting by the Stags in the Park announcing their presence rather loudly, to any female deer, due to the time of year. This did have the effect of ratcheting up the tension levels of some of the Scouts a couple of notches!

A successful Patrol bake-off night run by Chris, followed by a slightly less successful PL's treasure hunt night, led us into the half term break.

We resumed meetings after the break with a first aid night covering, first response, resuscitation, recovery position, cuts, bruises and bandages, burns and scalds, hyperthermia, allergic reactions, and shock.

My thanks go to Alison Moss and Maria Sprostranova for giving up their time to help with the first aid instruction, which, if left to just the available leaders, would be very hard to complete.

To coincide with bonfire-night we held the next meeting outside, with fire-lighting instruction and practice, plus toasting marshmallows (which didn't seem to need much practice).



To enable the Scouts to complete a cooking evening in a manageable and safe manner, we split the Scouts into two groups. One group will go climbing at White Spider in Tolworth, whilst the other group

are cooking at the HQ. We then swap the groups round, so the climbers are then cooking and vice-versa. This helps keep the number of Scouts using sharp knives and gas burners at a reasonable level for each session.

The Activity badge we've chosen to complete this term is the Astronomer badge.

The Scouts were given instruction on the solar system, planets and their distances from the Sun with a practical demonstration to illustrate this. They learnt about terrestrial and celestial spheres, planets and moon orbits, neap and spring tides and their causes.

They learnt about constellations and finding north by the stars. Unfortunately, due to the cloud cover, we'll have to do the constellation observations (star gazing) next term.

The last two meetings of the term were a bit more light-hearted, with an improv night followed by ten-pin bowling at the Rotunda in Kingston to finish the term off. I think we may have discovered some budding actors in our midst but sadly no potential professional bowlers!
