All the Beavers learned their home address including post code and a parents phone number then we talked about asking an appropriate safe adult for help. We practised dealing with cuts, bruises, reassuring a casualty, ringing 999 and put young adults into the recovery position.

Several Beavers swam up the river to Cubs, ready for more fun activities and challenge.

We fitted in a hike to Pembroke lodge with a bug hunt, bell-boating at Thames Young

Mariners and a fun and energetic Halloween Disco. Machines were invented, some useful in the home and some using blue sky thinking!

We painted pebbles, learned knots, did problem solving exercises. Parachute games usually start the Beaver sessions and games involving teeth, beans and Captains are popular. A Christmas craft session and a party with silly games end the term.

# Scouts on land and sea

Summer Camp this year was held at Phasels Wood in Hertfordshire. The Scouts had a fun-packed activity schedule which included, archery, crate-stacking, climbing, Cresta run, air rifles, Land Zorbs, kayaking, wood cutting, backwoods cooking, hiking and finally on the last day, ice skating. Unfortunately for us, it turned out to be the wettest July in living memory but luckily most of the activities were completed between the showers.

When Troop meetings resumed after the Summer break, we took one last opportunity to get out onto the water before the clocks went back and brought darkness to our Tuesday meetings.

The following week we set the Scouts a pioneering challenge, giving them several poles of differing thickness and length and some rope. Their challenge was to make a ladder out of them but what they didn't know was that they then had to use it to climb up the outside of the building and up onto the balcony!

This year after a three year break due to Covid, Leander entered three boats into the Great River Race that runs from Greenwich to Petersham in mid-September. We had a Scout crew, Explorer crew and a Mutineers crew (leader's and parents). All three crews did very well but the Scouts were exceptional and came first in their class!



Back to Tuesday meetings and we did two weeks of split activities, with one half of the Troop air rifle shooting on the Boat Deck, whilst the other half were upstairs baking biscuits.

It also aims to make them aware of the amount of time they spend online and to be careful of the various manipulation techniques advertisers use.

Senior Scout Cruise, from *Water Rat*, November 1963 (edited!!)


We set off at 10 on Sunday 25th August in 'OXO' [Group minibus]. We were going to sail in one of the Ocean Youth Club's boats, Duet, a 22 ton gaff-rigged yawl, berthed at Cowes. We learnt that the previous week's trip had been a little rough and most of the bedding was soaking. We spent the night in bunks in one of their buildings.

The boat has a fo'c'sle up forward, a miniature galley, half taken up by the mast in the centre, the main saloon with the table and food lockers, and the after cabin. The following day was spent getting the boat ready. On Tuesday, we sailed in the Solent, so that Jo, the skipper, could see how well we did.

The trip to Cherbourg on Wednesday was a bit rough especially at first, and many of us were either sick or flat out on the deck. There is little to say about the journey across: all you could see was sea! Late evening we were entering Cherbourg Harbour.
