50 years ago

Group accounts for the year 1959/60 show that the total amount of subs collected was £65 8s 3d. Cubs paid 3d (1¼p) per week, Scouts 6d (2½p), Seniors (age 15-18) and Rovers (18+) 9d per week. Funds were raised from Bob-a-Job week (£52), Bazaar (£55), Jumble Sale (£51), Catering (£46). The Garden Fete in the Summer of 1959 came at the end of a week of heavy rain storms, two of which were of the day of the event, and only raised £32. A fibreglass gig was purchased for £310, and the excess of expenditure over income was £266.

The United Nations had announced 1959-1960 as World Refugee Year (the last refugee camps in Europe were not closed until the end of 1960), The Troop delivered leaflets during one Tuesday meeting and went out collecting clothes each night in one week to take them to the WVS (Women's Voluntary Service) to be sent to refugees.

An Easter Camp was held for Patrol Leaders at Longridge, which was attended by Malcolm, Noggin, Daisy and Keith (Maund). Keith says: ' ... we invaded the site's boats and did just about everything we shouldn't have done in them. Returning to camp, we consumed the remainder of the 7lbs of fruit cake during our tea."





Cubs – outdoors, adventure and fitness

Our focus for the last couple of months has been the outdoors, adventure and fitness.

ThamesWatch is а wildlife campaign that has been running for the last two years, the main aim of which is to get out and about, explore the Thames and experience the vast array of wildlife it has to offer. The prize is a free trip along the river on a boat similar to Turks launches, so watch out for further details in the Autumn ...
