## 50 years ago

Seven Seniors took the new fibre-glass gig to the Medway the week-end before Easter, leaving HQ at 23.30, 1/2hour rowing, 1/2-hour sleeping. At 07.00, by Ford's Dagenham, they moored to a barge, rigged the boat, then sailed, in the rain, to Greenhithe. Breakfast was cooked in the Village Hall. With the wind and tide. they averaged seven knots to Tilbury Docks. A mile or two further, Whiskey was at the helm when the tiller broke - not far off the shore, but, at that point, it did not look inviting. After struggling to row against the tide and wind they moored to a buoy, and a Police Launch offered a tow to Sheemess. They sailed up the Medway to the Arethusa, where they slept the night and then went home.

The next week-end, a crew of six went to the Arethusa on Thursday, sailing up the river on Friday morning, hoping to get to Toribridge. Just above Rochester Bridge they discovered the river was not as deep as hoped, so it was necessary to perfect a system of bouncing along the river bed on the centre plate, without tipping over. Passing the delightfully-named Snodland, Mac was at the helm when another tiller broke. A mile after passing through the first lock on the Medway, a suitable place to camp was found, near Maidstone. That evening, they went to the cinema, and left early the following morning to the Arethusa, where they slept Saturday night.

On Sunday, after three hours' sailing they reached the Thames. Off Sheerness the gig was taking in a lot of water over the bow on port tack – about six inches deep, and Mac and Shrimp in the bows were getting hit in the back by every wave. Reaching Greenhithe at 19.30, they were unable to stay at the hall as planned. The SM of Greenhithe Troop worked for a shipping firm, and arranged for them to go on a tanker, *Astrality*, where they were given the Officers' mess and a galley – extremely warm, a great contrast to outside.

They rowed from there at midnight, got a tow for a few miles from a Police Launch near Ford's. After sleeping in the M.L. at Lambeth, they left for Kingston, arriving at 19.30. It had been most enjoyable, although the gig was covered with a thick layer of oil and petrol.
